



 Removing paperclips, staples, etc...





Principles

• **Provenance**: materials from same creator (person, family, organization) be kept together and not intermingled.

 Original Order: keep material together in order, not rearranging or reorganizing

Processing

- Surveying, arranging, describing, preserving, and making it accessible to users
- No two collections are exactly the same
- No two archivists would process a collection in the same way
- General principles of provenance and original order to guide our work
- Follow national standards as well as local practice




